


## **COMMUNICATION**

## Key Question: How would you survive in the desert? What would it be like to live in a desert?



Geographical Vocabulary		
Arid	Extremely dry.	
Precipitation	Rain, snow, sleet, or hail that falls to or condenses on the ground.	
Climate	The weather and temperature usually found in an area over a long period of time.	
Desertification	When land changes into a desert, usually because of extreme climate change.	
Erosion	Wearing rock away.	
Equator	An imaginary line around the centre of the Earth.	
Human features	Areas of land which are man-made/synthetic.	
Physical features	These are physical characteristics of the land that are formed naturally (mountains, rivers etc).	





#### In this topic, we are learning to:

- be able to describe the location of deserts around the world.
- draw a climate graph and explain the main characteristics of deserts.
- be able to explain how landforms are created in the desert.
- be able to explain how plants have adapted to survive in deserts.
- explain how animals have adapted to survive in harsh conditions like deserts.

#### Overview

- A desert is a place that gets very little rainfall. Most deserts get less than 250 millimetres of rain per year.
- For comparison, the UK receives an average of around 1000 millimetres of rain.
- We normally think of hot places when we think of deserts, but deserts can also be cold places. For example, large parts of Antarctica are considered to be deserts.
- As deserts do not have much water, only certain plants and animals can live there.
   These tend to be plants and animals that have specially adapted to the desert climate.




#### **ACCELERATED READER**

- We are starting a new reading programme across the school
- All children will be taking a Star Reader test which will give them a book level and colour
- Children will then select books at this level to bring home in addition to their book from the LRC. These books are 'real books' rather than from a scheme for example they could be The Gruffalo or Matilda depending on the level of the child. There are 180,000 on the programme so lots of choice
- Once they have read the book they will then do an online quiz to show how much they have understood before selecting a new book. They should score 80% and above on the quiz if they have read the book and selected a book at the right level
- More information will be sent out to parents explaining exactly how the programme works
- Children will be expected to be changing books every 2-3 weeks depending on their level. They should read at home every night for 20 minutes.



## **HOMEWORK**



- Homework will be set using CGP workbooks. Each child will be given their own booklet to complete.
- Children will be set two pages from their workbooks to complete twice a week.
- In addition to this, children will be given homework on google classrooms on Friday.
- This will including a reading task, arithmetic and spellings.
- Children will also be expected to go on TTRockstars and complete reading quizzes using Accelerated reader.
- Every child should be reading every day. They are responsible for ensure that they record their reading daily. It is their decision how they record reading. There are ideas in the planner.

- Planners will be checked once a week.
- Your child's planner will have logins for them to use Google Classroom,

## **ONLINE SAFETY**

#### KS2 Pupil Online Acceptable Use Agreement

#### This agreement will help keep me safe and help me to be fair to others

- O I am an online digital learner I use the school's internet and devices for schoolwork, homework and other activities to learn and have fun. I only use sites, games and apps that my trusted adults say I can.
- I am a secure online learner I keep my passwords to myself and reset them if anyone finds them out.
- O I am careful online I think before I click on links and only download when I know it is safe or has been agreed by trusted adults. I understand that some people might not be who they say they are, so I should be very careful when someone wants to be my friend.
- O I am private online I only give out private information if a trusted adult says it's okay. This might be my home address, phone number or other personal information that could be used to identify me or my family and friends.
- O I keep my body to myself online I never change what I wear in front of a camera and remember that my body is mine and mine only, and I don't send any photos without checking with a trusted adult.
- I say no online if I need to if I get asked something that makes me worried or upset or just confused, I say no, stop chatting and tell a trusted adult.
- I am a rule-follower online I know that some websites and social networks have age restrictions and I respect this; I only visit sites, games and apps that my trusted adults have agreed to.
- I am considerate online I do not join in with bullying or sharing inappropriate material.
- I am respectful online I do not post, make or share unkind, hurtful or rude messages/comments and tell my trusted adults if I see these.

#### KS2 Pupil Online Acceptable Use Agreement

- O I am part of a community I do not make fun of anyone or exclude them because they are different to me. If I see anyone doing this, I tell a trusted adult.
- O I am responsible online I keep others safe by talking to my trusted adults if a friend or person I know is being bullied or harassed or is worried or upset by things they read, watch or hear.
- O I don't do public live streams on my own and only go on a video chat if my trusted adult knows I am doing it and who with.
- I communicate and collaborate online with people I know and have met in real life or that a trusted adult knows about.
- O I am SMART online I understand that unless I have met people in real life, I can't be sure who someone is online, so if I want to meet someone for the first time, I must always ask a trusted adult for advice.
- I am a creative digital learner online I don't just spend time online to look at things from other people; I get creative to learn and make things! I only edit or delete my own digital work and only use other people's with their permission or where it is copyright free or has a Creative Commons licence.
- I am a researcher online I use safer search tools approved by my trusted adults. I understand that not everything online can be believed, but I know how to check things and know to 'double check' information I find online.

- The school planner has good information on acceptable use of devices.

#### **UNIFORM**

#### **CLUBS**

Year 6 can develop their skills in clubs such as dodgeball, cooking, baking, crafts, choir, netball, tag rugby, dance, chess, table tennis, Spanish, film, running and Lego.

Clubs begin at 3:15pm and end at 4:00pm. A timetable of clubs for the autumn term is usually published in September.

#### **CHARGEABLE EXTERNALLY LED CLUBS**

Clubs run in school by external providers are offered such as gymnastics, martial arts, French and football, these clubs are chargeable. They usually run from 3.00pm until 4.15pm.

## **ATTENDANCE**

- Children are expected to be in school every day and on time
- Data from 2019 shows that 84% of Key Stage 2 pupils who had 100% attendance achieved the expected standard, compared to 40% of pupils who were persistently absent across the key stage.
- Attendance below 96% has a negative impact on learning



# WALKING HOME ALONE/MOBILE PHONES

Year 6 students are permitted to walk home alone.

If you want your child/children to walk home alone you MUST complete a permission form found on WEDUC or through the school office who will then inform the class teacher.



## SATS AND MODERATION

- SATS week Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May to Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> May
- Reading, Maths (arithmetic and 2 reasoning), GPS
- Writing is assessed using teacher judgements that are moderated with other schools
- SATS are a measure of how well the school is performing we continue to teach a full broad and balanced curriculum and don't teach to the test.
- Our aim is to have children who are happy and eager to come to school

## **SAFETY**

- We know how daunting it can be letting your child go on a residential visit, so we do everything we can to make it a safe and enjoyable experience
- PGL policies and procedures are designed to make sure they adhere to the highest safety standards at all times:
- Continual safety and first aid training for all staff
- Regular checks on equipment before and after every activity session
- Qualified First-Aider on centre 24/7
- All staff are fully DBS checked
- PGL create a warm, supportive environment for pupils so they quickly feel at home. All their activities are progressive, allowing students to join in at whatever level they are comfortable with
